## **CELT Fall 2023 PLC Information**


CELT is offering two Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) this fall, open to faculty, staff, and administrators. See below for more details about each opportunity.

More details on *Stop Talking* from UAA:

"For 10,000 years, Alaska's Native peoples have survived and thrived in some of the harshest conditions in the world. During that time, they perfected teaching and learning practices that ensured the survival of their communities and the well being of their natural environments. Those ancient practices offer fresh insights for educators who care about the state of our world and seek ways to make education more relevant and engaging.

This book describes a unique higher education project that broke some difficult silences between academic and Native communities by introducing a small group of non-Native faculty members to traditional Alaska Native ways of teaching and learning. It presents a model for a Native-designed and run faculty development intensive, strategies for applying indigenous pedagogies in western learning environments, reflection on education by Alaska Native Elders, and reports from participants on what they learned and what they tried in their classrooms. It is intended to stimulate discussion and reflection about best practices in higher education."

## **Decolonizing Our Spaces PLC**

Decolonizing Our Spaces is a group for all UAS staff, faculty, and administrators who have decided to commit to actively transforming our institution into a more equitable and inclusive space. This PLC (professional learning community) will provide support for participants as they experiment with implementing a variety of new strategies via concrete actions, large and small, in their everyday practices in order to promote the decolonization of our university.

Participants should be willing to commit to regularly attending the fall semester sessions, which will be scheduled for one hour every two weeks, starting in early September. While some meeting time will be devoted to large-group sharing of resources such as reading material, videos, or short presentations, most of the time will be spent in small groups, where participants will reflect on their practices, share their experiences of implementing previous ideas, and offer support and new ideas for their peers.

Meetings will take place over Zoom to allow members from Juneau, Sitka, and Ketchikan to participate equitably.
