Gainful Employment Disclosure Definitions/Glossary

OPEID

Identification number used by the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Postsecondary Education (OPE) to identify schools that have Program Participation agreements (PPA) so that its students are eligible to participate in Federal Student Financial Assistance programs under Title IV regulations. This is a 6-digit number followed by a 2-digit suffix used to identify branches, additional locations, and other entities that are part of the eligible institution.

CIP

The Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) is a taxonomic coding scheme for postsecondary instructional programs/fields of study that facilitates the organization, collection, and reporting of program data. The CIP was developed by the U.S. Department of Education's National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) and is the accepted federal government statistical standard on instructional program classifications and is used in a variety of education information surveys and databases.

Program Level

Level 1 is an undergraduate certificate program. Level 4 is a graduate licensure program, established in 2008.

Tuition and Fees

The amount of tuition and required fees, based on resident tuition rates charged to a student for the entire program. Required fees are the fixed sum charged to students for items not covered by tuition and required of such a large proportion of all students that the student who does not pay the charge is an exception.

Normal Time

The amount of time necessary for a student to complete all requirements for a degree or certificate according to the UAS catalog, assuming full-time enrollment.

Books and Supplies

The average cost of books and supplies for a typical student for the entire program.

Annual Room and Board Charges

The annual charges assessed students for an academic year of rooming accommodations (for a typical student sharing a room with one other student) and meals.

Program Completion

When a student completes all program requirements and receives a degree, diploma, certificate, or other formal award. In order to be considered a completion, the degree/award must actually be conferred. Rates are not disclosed for programs with fewer than ten graduates in a year.

Federal Student Loans

Includes all Title IV student loans, such as Stafford (subsidized and unsubsidized). This does not include PLUS and other loans made directly to parents.

Private Loans

expenses to a borrower, regardless of whether the loan is provided through the educational institution that the student attends or directly to the borrower from the private educational lender.

Median Loan Debt

The middle loan amount in a list of all students' loan debts, above and below which lie an equal number of values.

On-time Completion Rate

For a given year, the percentage of students who completed a program within normal time out of the total number of students who completed the program.

Graduation Year

The period of time between July 1 of the previous calendar year and June 30. For example, the 2011 year is between July 1, 2010 and June 30, 2011.

Length in Months

Published program lengths are traditionally stated in terms of the number of semesters, and assume full-time attendance. There are 4.5 months per regular semester.

Graduates with Debt

The number of graduates who borrowed student loans during their program.
