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"The Politics of Climate Change" Forum

Juneau World Affairs Council November 10–12, 2011.

**Keynote Speaker: Detlef Sprinz, Potsdam Institute for Climate Impact Research
November 11, 7 p.m., Egan Library**

The keynote speaker for the 2011 Juneau World Affairs Council forum presents the next Evening at Egan at the University of Alaska Southeast. "Is Long-term Climate Policy Politically Feasible?" is the title of the talk by Detlef F. Sprinz of the Potsdam Institute for Climate Impact Research. The forum brings together international experts on climate change and the threat of water shortages, human rights concerns and international security.

In his talk Sprinz will explore: What is the capacity for democratic institutions to respond to science? How can governments pursue long-term policies that impact large segments of society, where delay or failure to act prevents a return at least to the present state?

The forum opens with a Thursday evening forum moderated by UAS Provost Rick Caulfield from 7:00 PM – 9:30 p.m., November 10 in the Egan Library. Setting the Stage is a panel discussion featuring four scientists on the current state of the science of climate change and the contrarian view: Brendan Kelly Deputy, Director of the Arctic Research Division of the National Science Foundation; Terry Chapin, one of the nation's leading ecologists and the only Alaskan appointed to the National Academy of Sciences; Patrick Michaels, Senior Research Fellow for Research and Economic Development at George Mason University and Syun-Ichi Akasofu, International Arctic Research Center founding director (UAF). The JWAC forum runs through Sunday, November 12 at the UAS Egan Building.

Sealaska Receives Federal Grant

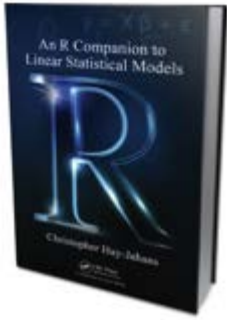
Federal grant to research Tlingit language recordings.

The \$150,000, two-year grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services will allow SHI to migrate more than one hundred recordings of people speaking Tlingit from an old format to a digital format, said SHI Archivist Zachary Jones. Recordings with the potential to aid language students and educators will be placed online. The grant will also fund an internship program between SHI and the University of Alaska Southeast, allowing undergraduate students studying Tlingit language to become involved in the project. The project includes the migration of the recordings into a digital format that will make them more accessible to modern-day Native language students and scholars. A sharing partnership will be established with the University of Alaska Fairbanks' Alaska Native Language Archive.

Hay Jahans Textbook Published

The Associate Professor of Mathematics developed the book to supplement his statistics courses.

Christopher Hay-Jahans textbook, "An R Companion to Linear Statistical Models" was published by Taylor & Franc. This book includes extensive and carefully explained examples of how to write programs using the R programming language. These examples cover methods used for linear regression and designed experiments with up to two fixed-effects factors,



including blocking variables and covariates. The Associate Professor of Mathematics developed the book to supplement his statistics courses.

Bullock Prize Nominations Sought

The University of Alaska Foundation is pleased to announce that nominations are now being accepted for the 2012 Edith R. Bullock Prize for Excellence.

The purpose of the prize is to recognize and reward an individual who has demonstrated excellence in support of the University of Alaska. Any individual, regardless of University affiliation, is eligible for nomination for the prize, which carries with it a \$20,000 award for the recipient. The selection committee will base its decision primarily on two criteria:

1. The extent to which the individual demonstrates a specific, definable, notable accomplishment which benefits the University (establishment of an academic or administrative program, the development of a course, the successful completion of a project, the achievement of a research discovery, the provision of a needed university or public service, the achievement of an educational goal, the publication of a thesis or paper, the achievement of national recognition, etc).
2. The extent to which the individual demonstrates general support of the University either through service, advocacy, philanthropy, etc.

Nominations must be completed on the Bullock Nomination form and can also be found on the Foundation Website. Nominations received in other formats will not be accepted. Only complete nominations will be considered.

Offices receiving this notice may independently solicit, collect and coordinate nominations at their MAU. All nominations from all sources must be received in the Foundation Office on or before the December 2, 2011 deadline, to be considered for the 2012 prize. Nominations received by the Foundation after that date will be considered for next year's prize.

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New Student Government Invites Student Involvement

The votes are in and 2011-2012 Student Government is back in action for another semester.

Amanda Daniels, the newly elected Student Body President, has tried her hand at the President position before and is looking forward to giving UAS her undivided attention.

"I always give everything 100 percent, so I decided to go straight for the President's position." Daniels explained. "I was on student government in high school and for one year in college. This time I wanted to try starting out at a smaller school."

Other first time Student Government members at UAS include Vice President Sonia Lodhi, as well as Student Senators Alex Caulkins, Callie Conerton, Angelo Katasse, Jarmyn Kramlich, and Mary Jo Barry.

With a nearly full Senate, Student Government will be concentrating on serving the UAS community through involvement, creating bills and talking to students. Already issues such as smoking on campus and recycling have been addressed.

New action has been taken regarding the survey proposed by Student Government to assist in determining the campus community's opinions of smoking on campus. Due to their lack of information on the specific State and Federal rules regarding smoking in public areas, Student Government moved to postpone their student survey until sufficient information has been collected.

Whether or not smoking should be allowed on campus has been an ongoing topic since last year explained Jarmyn Kramlich, a Student Senator.

"This issue has been going a long time and it's a very divisive issue." Kramlich said. "Students

want to comply with the rules, but no one is really sure what they are right now." Student Government has also approved the hiring of two new positions that will help with the current UAS recycling program that serves the Auke Bay campus as well as the UAS Technical Education Center and Bill Ray Center located downtown.

Other bills in the works plan to help support UAS Rec. Center sports teams with transportation and funding, in addition to a bill that will bring back the coffee and donut sessions in the mornings and possibly in the evenings on campus to help bridge the gap between students, faculty and Student Government.

"We are also working on having a Senator in the office throughout the day." said Daniels, who believes communication between students and their government is important.

"That way, if people have any questions or concerns, there is always someone available that is able to help them or answer questions."

The Student Senate is usually composed of seven senators and currently has five. Two other Senators will be sworn in during the next Student Government meeting providing a full Senate.

Student Government meetings are every Friday at 5 P.M. in the Maurant Conference Room.

Fall and Winter Construction Projects Update

Entry Improvements, Housing Picnic Shelter and Forest Service Research Laboratory

North Entry Improvements

In November Admiralty Construction will be installing new light fixtures at the intersection of Auke Lake Way and Back Loop Road. This will only take a few days and Auke Lake Way will remain open and unimpeded.

South Entry Improvements

CuttingEdge Development is finishing up for the winter on both the Hendrickson path and their storm drain excavation along Auke Lake Way in front of Soboleff and Hendrickson. They should be done by November 30, but neither the path nor Auke Lake Way will be paved before winter. Please use caution when driving that portion of Auke Lake Way and when entering/exiting the Chapel parking lot in front of Hendrickson. CuttingEdge will resume work after April 1, 2012.

Student Housing Picnic Shelter Bridge and Stair Demolition

The bridge and stair connecting the picnic shelter and the housing lodge have been taken down. Twenty-five years of rain and snow has not been kind to the structure; it was seriously rotted and was deemed unsafe under snow loads. Access to the picnic shelter will be by the path that continues from housing to the Rec. Center.

U.S. Forest Service Research Laboratory

Dawson Construction will continue work through the winter. The path to housing will be generally open and maintained by UAS. Any necessary path closures will be announced in advance and posted at both ends of the path.
